Sexual violence is any sexual behaviors, actions, and/or words where consent is not given freely and continues to be a serious issue in Texas.

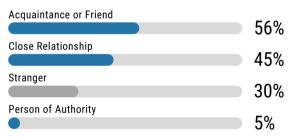

Percentages sum to more than 100% because victims may have been assaulted multiple times.

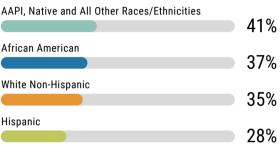
People who commit sexual violence are more likely to use drugs and alcohol than those who experience sexual violence.



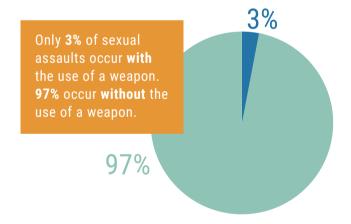
